## February 19, 2018

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Greenville was held on Monday, February 19, 2018, at 7:00 pm at Pioneer Hall.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Davis moved to accept the Clerk's minutes of January 15, 2018, seconded by Mr. Bensen. Carried 4 ayes

Oral and/or written reports were received from the Rescue Squad, Highway, Buildings and Grounds, Code, Clerk/Tax, Sewer and Water departments, and Planning Board. Highway Superintendent Williams said work has been ongoing with truck maintenance, and on general repairs. Grounds Supervisor Leroy Bear stated his department has been keeping up with light snow, working on a building at Vanderbilt Park which was slated to be taken down, and on safety issues. Code Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh reported that work for the addition at Stewart's will begin in early March. Also that he had some concerns which will need to be addressed with the next zoning review. Mr. Travis Smigel reported that Delaware Engineering was working on the Map, Plan and Report for the proposed sewer extension. Also that some actions were needed for the water district extension project, including setting up bonding and scheduling meetings to adopt proceedings and to hold the public hearing.

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to hold a special meeting on Monday, February 26, 2017 at 7:00 pm in Pioneer Town Hall, to adopt proceedings and to schedule a public hearing related to the water district extension.

Carried 4 ayes

Mr. Leroy Bear said the upgrades at the water plant are complete and it is running well. Supervisor Macko reminded those in attendance to get their STAR paperwork in to the Assessor's Department as the deadline is looming. Planning Board Chair Don Teator noted an impact study would be occurring at the next Planning Board meeting.

**Supervisor Macko** noted discussion on the fee schedule at the recycling center was tabled last month awaiting further details on tire fees; it was determined that the fee schedule remain as drafted with tires costing \$7.50 - \$30.00 per tire, depending on size.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Davis, to approve the revised Recycling Fee Schedule as presented, attached.

## **New business:**

Mr. Stephen Jay Goodman, local resident and attorney with the NYS Public Service Department, has been recommended as alternate member for the Town's Planning Board.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Davis, to appoint Mr. Stephen Jay Goodman as Alternate member of the Planning Board, effective immediately and carrying a term through December 31, 2018.

Deputy Water Superintendent Renee Hamilton is seeking approval to attend water school on March 13, 2018 at a cost of \$17, and on April 12, 2018 at a cost of \$25.

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, to approve attendance at water school for Ms. Hamilton, as outlined above.

Supervisor Macko reported that the Cairo-Purling Roller Rink is unavailable to host our winter youth skate this year, due to unforeseen circumstances. The Town Board has earmarked \$1,700 for youth services this year, and has been considering other possibilities, including bowling. They are open to suggestions.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting for public comments and questions at 7:19 pm: Mr. Macko met with Creighton Manning, the consulting engineers for the town sidewalk project. They would like to present information regarding design and timeframes to the board and the public;

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to conduct an informational meeting on Monday, April 9, 2018 at 7:00 pm in Pioneer Town Hall with Creighton Manning to discuss details related to the sidewalk project.

Carried 4 aves

Mr. Macko relayed requests from the Town of Durham Highway Superintendent as well as the East Durham Volunteer Fire Company, who were seeking 2 desks each. We have many extra set- ups in storage from when this building was an insurance company, left here with the building when it became Town Hall.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Davis, to declare as surplus and then donate 2 desks each to the Town of Durham and the East Durham Volunteer Fire Company.

The Greene County Council on the Arts has requested a donation to support their annual Sprouts program. This has been accounted for in our budget planning;

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to donate \$300 to the Greene County Council on the Arts for this purpose.

Greenville's Irish American Club has been in charge of the St. Patrick's Day parade since 1974, and is asking for financial help from the Town to help continue this tradition. Expenditures include insurance, use of St. John's parking lot for staging, and storage for banners and meeting room space, etc. Discussion ensued. It was suggested that the Town co-sponsor the parade, to allow them to go under our insurance as a rider. Meeting at the North Barn or the Library's Community room, as well as storing their banners on town property, would also provide savings. As the Club has already paid their bills for this year's parade, the discussion would continue next year at budget season. What has been offered in today's discussion surely will assist the club now and in the future, with little cost to the Town of Greenville.

Clerk-Collector Park noted several boxes of new volumes of Town of Greenville Veterans Memorial Book of Honor, volumes I and II, which the town had acquired and had been kept in storage. As we have these volumes on display for public viewing in Town Hall, she asked if the extras could be donated to the American Legion for use as they saw fit.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Davis, to declare as surplus and donate the unused volumes of Greenville's Veterans books to the Veterans at our American Legion.

As there are no further public comments, Mr. Bensen moved to enter executive session at 7:38 pm, seconded by Mr. Davis, to discuss the medical, financial, credit or employment history of a particular person/corp, or matters leading to said dismissal, removal, promotion, appointment, employment, discipline, demotion, or suspension.

## February 26, 2018

A special meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Greenville was held on Monday, February 26, 2018, at 7:00 pm at Pioneer Hall.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Smigel explained the purpose of this evening's meeting was to initiate funding opportunities for the water district expansion project. The Map, Plan & Report prepared by Delaware Engineering needs to be adopted and a Public Hearing needs to be scheduled for the next Town Board meeting in order to do this.

Supervisor Macko explained the issues at the upper levels of the Country Estates PUD; at certain times, residents are without adequate volume or pressure of water. The developer did not complete the project as was expected at the PUD. Also, our Town water system is over 40 years old and is due for upgrades. Mr. Macko and Mr. Smigel discussed the new water tower, which will result in a greater and ideal water pressure, as well as a better quality of water taste. The district is intended to extend out Route 81 East to the old Steven's farm, which will add approximately 20 properties, as well as extended on Route 32 North to encompass the new Tractor Supply site.

Councilman Davis sought to clarify the proposed resolution. He questioned if voting affirmatively with the resolution tonight was to agree to amend the existing water district, ensure the requirements are in place in order to seek funding, and does not mean the project has to be done as is described in the Map, Plan and Report (ensuring the project was still able to be amended after this resolution)? Supervisor Macko restated that this was just to start the process, and Residents would offer their input at the Public Hearing, at which time they could state their likes/dislikes/thoughts. Voting on the project by the Board would be done after the Public Hearing had closed.

Ms. Lindsay Allen from Delaware Engineering is our Grant Writer, and the EFC's DWSRF grant will be pursued. Supervisor Macko noted this extension opens possibilities of long term growth in the community in the area in the Meadowbrook

Lane and Turon Road areas. No further comments or questions from the audience were received.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Davis, to accept the resolution and order accepting a Map, Plan and Report and to schedule a public hearing on Monday, March 19, 2018 at 6:30 pm in Pioneer Town Hall.

## Gary Harvey -representing Preisner, Tryland & Gorch 25.00-2-24

Mr. Harvey stated that he was present tonight to resubmit maps for the property located at 158 Highland Rd. He stated that he was here a year ago with the maps showing the subdivision changes to make the proposed lot a 5 acre lot with a foundation. He stated that he had returned to the Planning Board because no one had picked up the previous set of maps that were approved. Tal reviewed the options for the Board which are: owners would need to go through process again, or as long as no changes-readopt the SEQRA and sign new maps. Mr. Harvey stated that as far as he knew there were no changes to the property since time. Tal stated that there would be conditions that would need to be met before the maps could be signed. They are: a letter of certification from the owner stating that there have been no changes to the property, the Board would then reconfirm the SEQRA and Neg Dec. and also the approval of the subdivision.

Motion made to reconfirm the Neg. Dec. and SEQR, as well as requiring letter of certification of no change, and also approval of subdivision made by Will Bardel. Seconded by Brian Wickes. All in favor: 4, opposed: 0, motion carried

## Gary Harvey -representing Walt Lampman 37.00-2-25

Mr. Harvey who was representing Walt Lampman presented plans that showed a subdivision on King Hill Road that would make a lot that is 3.2 acres. The zoning for that area is 5 acres. The Board stated that Mr. Harvey and Mr. Lampman would need to go before the ZBA first before the Planning Board could proceed with any possible subdivision.

Cypress Creek - Freehold Solar 51.00-1-5

Cypress Creek - Amberjack Solar 36.00-5-1

Cypress Creek - Red Mill Solar 36.01-1-9

Doug Warden attorney for Cypress Creek was present and reviewed the concerns that the Board had about the possible cumulative impact. He stated that there is a chance to look at the SEQRA again and change it if needed.

The potential impacts that Cypress Creek looked at were, Visual impact, Traffic, Drainage and water discharge, and Threatened and endangered species as listed in the handout that Cypress Creek provided. Mr. Frank reviewed the visual impact that has already been done on the Freehold, Amberjack and Red Mill projects. He also stated that they have looked at the impact for the proposed Ingalside project.

Mr. Reagan and Mr. Utschig reviewed the traffic impact. They stated that they will come up with a plan that will have project 1 start then on day 30 project 2 will start and so on.

They also reviewed the Drainage impact. Brian is concerned about all of the projects discharging into the same stream.

Mr. Reagan stated that each site is different pertaining to the requirements for the endangered species. Will asked if the 8' fence surrounding the site have any impact on the migratory patterns of the native wildlife. Mr. Reagan didn't believe that there would be any impact.

Brian asked if when the new maps are made that one of the overlays include the houses so that the Board can see the where the house are in relation to the projects. Brian also asked for a topography overlay. Tal reminded everyone that even though they are looking at the cumulative impact that they still need to look at each project individually.

After a brief discussion about the possible changes in character of the area, the decommissioning of the potential sites back to their natural states, taking the grid from 8.5 megawatts to only having .5 megawatts available, Don stated that he felt what was discussed had given the Board a better overview. Ms. Matott stated that she could place a line in the local paper to welcome all residence to attend the next scheduled Planning Board meeting, to hopefully get more information about the solar projects out to more residences of the Town.

Mr. Reagan stated that Cypress Creek would present the reports with the additional information on the impacts for all 4 potential projects at our next scheduled meeting. If reports are acceptable upon review than the Board could amend the Neg. Dec. with supplements, and could vote to approve or disprove the applications.

I was especially heartened by the September meeting, one that I missed because of an excursion to the Baltic countries. Audrey Matott accepted the challenge of creating a meeting during my absence, the first such one ever. A look back at Greenville 50 years ago, based on the Greenville Local, was a worthy idea, and an equally challenging one for someone who did not grow up here. Or, perhaps, because Audrey did not grow up here allowed for a detached view. Thank you, Audrey, for being a role model for others who might consider taking up this challenge. And I suspect it was a good learning experience for you.

All the year's programs were recounted in the newsletter to a degree that I hoped would serve as a reminder and recorder of the evening, even though no newsletter truly captures an happening the following month but the program regimen has forced some discipline on me.
