The regular monthly meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Greenville was held on Monday, November 19, 2018, at 7:00 pm at Pioneer Hall.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Eugene Somers presented an update on his Eagle Scout project to the Board. Losee Cemetery, on Surprise Result Road, needed much tending. After several weeks' work, he repaired the fence, managed the overgrown brush, and righted stones that had fallen. Supervisor Macko thanked him for all of his efforts, and called it a "fantastic" job, well done.

Mrs. Blenis, Mr. Volmar, and Mr. Kerner discussed an undertaking involving four GCS high school students at the South Barn in Vanderbilt Park. The barn, although currently with an intact roof and foundation, is in a state of need. These students, under the direction of Mrs. Blenis, an architect, Mr. Volmar, mentor and retired educator, and Mr. Kerner, current teacher of auto-CAD and engineering at GCS, had the opportunity to evaluate this structure. They have measured and drawn the building onsite, and now have the ability to go back into the classroom and apply it into the auto-CAD program. The students will then deliver a folder of documents/information/plans to the town with this preliminary work complete. The group is not offering hands-on repair/restoration work, nor is pushing the town to complete the repairs. It simply is an opportunity for learning at a local site; it will give the students further connection to the town of Greenville through hands-on evaluation and application. Supervisor Macko feels it is a great learning project for the kids which will introduce them to design and restoration.

Mr. Bear moved to accept the Clerk's minutes of October 15<sup>th</sup>, October 22<sup>nd</sup>, and November 7<sup>th</sup>, 2018, seconded by Mr. Davis. Carried 5 ayes

Oral and/or written reports were received from the Rescue Squad, Highway, Buildings and Grounds, Code, Clerk/Tax, Sewer and Water departments, Assessing, and Dog Control:

Greenville Rescue Squad, Inc. - Matthew Marlow provided both a written and oral report.

<u>Highway</u> – Superintendent Terry Williams verbally reported on winter preparations. Discussion occurred regarding the new fuel delivery system; hopefully the installation will progress in the coming week. Also discussed was putting to auction some older equipment.

<u>Buildings and Grounds</u> – Maintenance Supervisor Leroy Bear verbally offered a report on work done this month, including the new storage building near the Park, and the Pioneer building's garage roof. Preparations are underway for the tree lighting ceremony on Friday, Nov. 23<sup>rd</sup>.

<u>Codes</u> – Code Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh provided both a written and oral report. Also commented on another Eagle Scout project underway involving a new sign on Route 81, near Maple Avenue, for the American Legion.

<u>Sewer</u> – Supervisor Macko reported the plant has been running without problems. Connection fees related to the new extension were addressed; the grace period has come and gone and after 2 ½ years, several hook ups still have not occurred. The fee for connection for a commercial entity is \$4,000 and for a residential entity, \$3,000. The Sewer fund has owed the General fund \$80,000 since 2006-2009 and Mr. Macko suggests applying the funds obtained here into the General fund as a means of beginning to replenish that debt.

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to deposit these sewer connection fees into the General Fund to replace money loaned from the Sewer Fund. The fees are per the December 17, 2007 Resolution outlining a \$4,000 fee per commercial connection and a \$3,000 fee per residential connection.

Carried 5 ayes

Water – Water Superintendent Leroy Bear first questioned if the water connection fees remained the same as said 12/17/2007 resolution; the Board replied "yes". Written report provided. Supervisor Macko reported that the Governor's Office has awarded the Town of Greenville a grant of \$1,107,180 for drinking water upgrades; this is 60% of the cost of the water project and will result in substantial savings for our residents. Delaware Engineering's Travis Smigel will prepare a general outline for this project; bids will be sought by late springtime, with construction hopefully beginning by the Fall of 2019.

Mr. Leroy Bear also discussed 8-9 foot square 'cubes' offered by the Office of General Services which he would like to obtain a few to use for storage at the water plant and elsewhere as needed. They are approximately \$50 per unit, plus the cost of transportation.

Councilman Bear moved, seconded by Councilman Bensen, to allow Supervisor Macko and Water Superintendent Bear to pursue and purchase 4 cubes the next time they become available. Carried 5 ayes

Supervisor Macko also noted that Tractor Supply's issues with the Health Department have resolved and they are now allowed to use the water. Code Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh added that they've received their permanent Certificate of Occupancy now, as well.

Recycling - Councilman Bear reported that all is well at the Recycling Center.

<u>Assessing</u> – Assessor Gordon Bennett verbally reported on senior STAR exemptions as well as the town's senior exemptions. NYS is now mandating automatic renewal and income verifications for both of these exemptions. Supervisor Macko inquired as to Mr. Bennett's opinion if the Town creates an

Emergency Medical special district; he stated creating a district would be a very transparent process, 100% of the assessed value would be achieved through a district, and it would aid in the tax cap calculations. Mr. Bennett did ask that the Town create this prior to the next taxable status date (March 1st) for ease in application.

<u>Planning Board</u> – Written report received from Chair Donald Teator and read aloud by Supervisor Macko. Attorney Rappleyea noted Cypress Creek will be on the agenda for the December meeting.

<u>Dog Control</u> – DCO Rosa readdressed prior discussion regarding amending the Town's Dog Law to include provisions for abandoned dogs. Much of our law is per guidelines and standards of NYS Agriculture and Markets, and some verbiage cannot change. A draft law was provided to the Town Board last month, including verbiage on violations as they relate to unpaid fees, and they feel ready to proceed to a public hearing.

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to conduct a public hearing for Local Law #3 of 2018: Licensing, Regulating and Controlling the Activities of Dogs, on Monday, December 17, 2018 at 7:00 pm in Pioneer Town Hall.

Carried 5 ayes

#### New business discussed at 7:43 pm:

DCO Melissa Rosa has submitted a letter of resignation effective December 1st. Supervisor Macko and Councilman Bear thanked her for 11 years of service to the Town and wished her well in the future; Councilman Davis stated, "It's been a job well done."

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to accept this resignation with regret.

Carried 5 ayes

Ms. Sherry Vieta, DCO currently serving in the Towns of Athens for the past 8 years, and more recently serving in Coxsackie and Catskill as well, wishes to be considered for appointment. She is fully trained, recently passed her annual Ag & Markets inspection, and is available to start on December 1st. Mrs. Rosa has offered to aid in the transition.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to appoint Ms. Vieta for a trial term beginning December 1, 2018 – March 31, 2019 at a salary of 1/12<sup>th</sup> per month as the current DCO earned.

Carried 5 ayes

Two shared service agreements have been addressed at recent meetings. 1. An agreement for snow plowing between the Greenville Fire District and the Town's Maintenance Department was discussed. All parties are comfortable with the agreement;

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Davis, to accept this agreement and authorize Supervisor Macko to sign it.

Carried 5 ayes

2. Next was an agreement between the Greene County Sheriff's Office and the Town of Greenville for use of upstairs office space and for providing court security measures two hours weekly during regular court sessions. As there are a few points of concern with the agreement on behalf of the GCSO, this agreement is tabled until next month's meeting.

The 2019 Ambulance Contract with Greenville Rescue Squad, Inc., was discussed. As all parties are in agreement with said contract for \$277,500.00;

Mr. Bear moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to accept this 1 year contract between the Town of Greenville and the Greenville Rescue Squad Inc.; attached.

Carried 5 ayes

Annually, any unpaid water or sewer rents are submitted back to Greene County to be relevied onto the next property tax bill.

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to approve the attached 2018 TAX RELEVY & MISC. LEVY REPORT for water and sewer rents, in the amount of \$13,760.90.

Carried 5 ayes

Supervisor Macko noted the 2018 Old Timer's Party will be held at the Greenville High School on Sunday, December 2<sup>nd</sup>. As the phone number published was incorrect, please contact Mr. Macko at 518-966-5055 extension 2 should you need to request a meal be delivered.

Justice-elect Kevin Lewis needs approval for training which will occur on December 10<sup>th</sup> – 14<sup>th</sup>.

Mr. Bear moved to allow this educational training, seconded by Mr. Bensen.

Carried 5 ayes

Supervisor Macko relayed that the stained glass windows out for repair are expected to return for reinstallation in January, and he would like to put out to bid the remaining 3 windows (B, C, & E).

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, to request sealed bids for the Prevost Hall Stained Glass Repair and Renovation, Windows B, C and E, to be opened on Monday, December 17, 2018 at 7:00 pm.

Carried 5 ayes

Clerk-Collector Park provided a notice to Supervisor Macko regarding term expirations of appointed and elected officials. Of note, a position is open on the Board of Assessment Review due to the death of Mr. David Battini. Assessor Bennett suggested reviewing the list of applicants who have already applied for this position in the past; the Board agreed.

Supervisor Macko noted that as claims have been low, NYMIR will be sending 4 disbursements back to the town in the amount of \$618.85, totaling \$2,475.40.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting for public comments & questions at 7:58 pm: Councilman Davis reported concerns about Veteran's Exemptions. As the Greenville School Board recently passed a Veteran's exemption, and considering 35% of the students at GCS qualify for a free or reduced lunch, 12% of Greene County residents are living below the poverty line, and 10% of households are single women, he would like to discuss the level of exemption we offer. Assessor Bennett reported that currently, the Town offers an exemption which is 5 levels above the minimum; the other towns he works in offer the exemption at 2-3 levels below Greenville. Councilman Davis stated he personally thinks this Town Board should consider moving that exemption back down towards the minimum level, and that there should be limits on how much is placed on the backs of other people. No other comments received.

Code Enforcement Officer Overbaugh questioned if the Board had considered his request to determine an appropriate fee for commercial solar building permits. He recommended charging 10 cents per square foot of panel size, as this provides the most accurate data with which to base the fee. Discussion ensued. It was noted that the Town of Durham set their fee at 15 cents per square foot, and how it may be wise to be consistent with the neighboring towns.

Mr. Bear moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to set the fee for commercial solar construction on the Town of Greenville Building Permit at 15 cents per square foot of panel size.

Carried 5 ayes

Food Pantry volunteer Paul Augstein requested gutters be placed over the East side door of the building, as roof water runs off where the food deliveries are made. Maintenance Supervisor Leroy Bear will evaluate and arrange for this addition.

Mr. Leroy Bear also inquired about the delay in approving the GCSO shared service agreement. As there is no agreement in place yet, and the GCSO plans on initiating renovations in the morning, he asked about liability concerns of work being done to the town building. Also inquired as to "who was responsible for what" as far as the Maintenance Department was concerned, as there was nothing in the agreement to address ongoing cleaning, maintenance or repairs. Councilman Richards, who is also a GCSO Deputy, relayed that the agreement's issues involve the request for a main floor bathroom, and not allowing other people in "the Pioneer Building" as it is too broad of a statement. Clerk-Collector Park asked the Board and Maintenance Department what would be done to provide a better functioning and reliable, main level, handicapped bathroom when the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor became inaccessible to employees. Civility was also requested by Clerk-Collector Park in the interactions between Town Hall officials and members of the GCSO. Lengthy discussion ensued. Councilman Richards advised the County wait to start work until the contract has been signed. Councilman Bear feels that if the County's Building and Grounds Department can't assist with a bathroom, as the contract resolves to use 'the entire second floor, including all common areas, such as hallways and bathrooms, to be used by the GCSO solely for administrative and detective personnel', "maybe we should think about this more. We're giving quite a lot at a reduced rate. This discussion is at the last hour and they want to start work tomorrow ~ it is very unprofessional. They should be here to discuss concerns with the Board, not just send word." Maintenance Supervisor Leroy Bear suggested allowing exclusive use of only the former Greenville Press area, which was secure, and leaving the hallway and bathroom outside of the contract. Agreed the main level bathroom will still need to be addressed in the future.

Attorney Rappleyea will make adjustments to the agreement.

Mr. Davis moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to conduct a special meeting on Monday, November 26, 2018 at 7:00 pm to review and readdress this agreement.

Carried 5 ayes

There being no further comments, Mr. Bensen moved to enter executive session at 8:35 pm, seconded by Mr. Bear, to discuss the proposed acquisition/sale/lease of real property when publicity might affect value. Mr. Travis Smigel was invited to participate.

Carried 5 ayes

Mr. Bensen moved to return to regular session at 9:09 pm, seconded by Mr. Richards.

Carried 5 ayes

#### November 7, 2018 Minutes

Attendees: Planning Board Members: Don Teator, Ken Elsbree, Bud Bear, Debra Danner, Jay Goodman, Attorney: Tal Rapplyea, and PB Clerk: Hope Nugent.

Guests: Tom Vance, Michelle Brandon, Pete Liquari, Barry Blenis, Barbara Valicenti, plus 4 others in audience

Meeting opened by Don Teator at 7:00 pm with the Pledge of Allegiance

## Change of Use - Tom Vance - Main Street 12.04-3-16

Mr. Vance was here tonight and reviewed his plans for the building. He will be turning the building into a restaurant/brew pub. It had previously been used as a mercantile. He is hoping to bring the front of the building back to its original appearance. He will be removing part of the back of the building and will be using the site for an open patio as well as extra parking. He is hoping to open in the spring of 2019. He will have 30 taps of craft beverages including beers, cider meads, etc. He stated that he is anticipating being open Thursday – Sunday with hours no earlier than 9am on Sunday and no later than 11pm on Friday night. Don reviewed the Site Plan questions for the Board. Questions that were asked were if there would be a noise issue, any changes in exterior lighting, traffic, and how many seats would be available and would a sprinkler system be installed. Mr. Vance stated the noise level would be minimal since all new insolation and windows will be done. No lighting would be changed at this point. Down lighting on the front walk would be added at some point. There would be no changes to the traffic pattern in town. Mr. Vance also stated that a sprinkler system would not need to be installed as he was only planning on 90 seats. Tal recommended that Mr. Vance bring in cut sheets to show the exterior lighting as well as the sign that is proposed.

Motion made to schedule Public hearing for December 5, 2018 made by: Debra Danner, seconded by: Ken Elsbree: All in favor: 5, Opposed: 0, motion carried.

#### Special Use Permit - Michelle Brandon - 23.02-3-44

Ms. Brandon was here tonight to review her Special Use Permit to the Board for a bottle redemption center in Norton Hill. Ms. Brandon brought a sketch of the building. However, the Board was concerned about the availability of parking for customers as well as for the tractor trailer that would be making the pickups at the location. Ms. Brandon stated that the tractor trailer would not be there during business hours so there would be room for customers which could possibly 2-3 at a time. After discussing that the tractor trailer would be backing up to the building it was suggested that Ms. Brandon test to make sure it would fit as some of the Board members feel there is not enough room. It was suggested that when she did the test to let the Board know so that they could witness it. A concern from the floor was also raised that customers would have to back out onto SR 81. The Board recommended looking into removing the grassy area in front of the building to allow for enough parking, 5 regular spot and 1 handicapped, this would also allow for the tractor trailer to be able to pull into the area and not have to back in. Don reviewed the site plan check list and stated to Ms. Brandon that they would need a

more accurate drawing with true distance of driveways and where parking would be. They would also need to show the location of the well, septic, trees, bushes, lighting on building and any street lighting. The Board would also like to see the signs that would be used especially one stating no drop offs.

## <u>Subdivision – Barry Blenis - Willowbrook Rd. 26.00-2-32.11</u>

Mr. Blenis was present tonight to review with the Board his plans to subdivide his piece of property to make 2 parcels. The smallest parcel would be 20 acres. Mr. Blenis had the deeds that showed that there is already a right of way to reach the parcel. Tal suggested that Mr. Blenis set up a road maintenance agreement for each parcel that uses the right of way. Mr. Blenis will also need to fill out a SEQRA, have an updated survey and a new deed with the road agreement.

Motion made to schedule Public hearing for December 5, 2018 made by: Ken Elsbree, seconded by: Bud Bear: All in favor: 5, Opposed: 0, motion carried.

#### Possible subdivision - Pete Liquari - Teller Road

Mr. Liquari was present tonight to inquire of the Board if he would be able to subdivide his property which 15 acres into 2 lots with the smallest is possibly being 2 acres. There is already an apartment building on the property and there is also a shared driveway which is would be used by 3 parcels if subdivision is acceptable. Tal stated that he would need to see the deeds for the parcels in question to see the right of way and maintenance agreement. The Board would also need to see a survey with the proposed subdivision.

AGREEMENT
Between
Columbia-Greene Humane Society/SPCA
And
The Town of
GREENVILLE

THIS AGREEMENT is made for the period of January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019, between the Town of GREENVILLE, New York, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality"

The Columbia-Greene Humane Society, Inc., a membership corporation existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York, for the prevention of cruelty to and the protection of animals, having its principal place of business in the Town of Claverack, County of Columbia, State of New York, hereinafter referred to as the "Humane Society."

#### WITNESSETH:

That, pursuant to Article 7 of the Agriculture and Markets Law of the State of New York, the Humane Society, in consideration of payment to it by the Municipality of several sums of money herein agreed to be paid at the time and in the manner hereinafter more particularly described, hereby covenants and agrees for itself and its successors, as follows:

<u>FIRST</u>: That it will undertake, through its duly appointed agents, the impoundage of all unleashed, unlicensed, or untagged dogs brought to it by the Dog Control Officer (hereinafter referred to as the "DCO") of the Municipality, which have been found to have been running at large in violation of provision of Article 7 of the Agriculture and Markets Law of the State of New York and any existing local law enacted by the Municipality. It will also provide proper food and shelter for such dogs while in its possession until redeemed or otherwise disposed of pursuant to, and as provided in, Article 7 of the Agriculture and Markets Laws and any existing local law enacted by the Municipality.

SECOND: The Humane Society will provide and maintain a shelter for seized dogs; will properly care for all dogs in such a shelter; and will humanely euthanize or make available for adoption seized dogs not redeemed as provided in Article 7 of the Agriculture and Markets Law. Such shelter shall at all times during the term hereof be under care and charge of a competent employee and shall be open to the public at reasonable hours for the purpose of receiving applications for the redemption of dogs as provided by law. Such shelter shall be open daily between

the hours of 11:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., with New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas excepted, during the term of this Agreement. Such shelter shall be maintained in an approved location in the Town of Claverack so as to not be reasonably objectionable to the residents thereof.

THIRD: The Humane Society and the Municipality will comply with the provisions of Article 7 of the Agriculture and Markets Law and with the applicable provisions of the Public Health Law of the State of New York and any rules and regulations promulgated thereto in relation to the seizure, holding care, redemption, and disposition of seized dogs. This Agreement applies to dogs seized under the provisions of Article 7 only. Any other animals seized for any reason or purpose, including but not limited to quarantine and cruelty cases, will be accepted at the sole discretion of the Humane Society, and shall be billed to the Municipality separately from the fee structures outlined in Paragraph Seventh, below.

<u>FOURTH</u>: The Municipality and the Humane Society each hereby reserve the right to cancel and declare this Agreement null and void at any time during the period of the same for reason of the failure of the Municipality or the Humane Society to perform any of the terms and conditions herein contained.

<u>FIFTH</u>: The Humane Society and the DCO for the Municipality will both file and maintain a complete record of any seizure and subsequent disposition of any dog in the manner prescribed by Article 7, §113 (sub. 4) of the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets Law. If the dog is an identified dog as determined by Article 7, §117, the DCO shall notify the owner of the dog's location. Redeemed dogs shall be licensed or have proof of a current license prior to leaving the custody of the Humane Society pursuant to Article 7, §117 (sub. 4) of the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets Law. All licenses must be issued by the municipality wherein the dog's owner resides. The Humane Society will assist in obtaining necessary vaccinations for dogs eligible for redemption to facilitate municipal dog licensing; however, it is the sole responsibility of the redeemed dog's owner to obtain a license from their resident municipality before the dog can be released from the custody of the Humane Society. A tag shall not be considered proof of current license.

<u>SIXTH</u>: The Humane Society will remit all impoundment fees collected in carrying out the provisions of this Agreement to the Fiscal Officer of the Municipality, provided that there are no outstanding fees owed to the Humane Society from the Municipality. However, should the Municipality be negligent in paying contractual fees, the Humane Society may retain the impoundment fees in exchange for monies owed.

<u>SEVENTH</u>: In consideration of the complete performance by the Humane Society of the terms of this Agreement, the Municipality hereby agrees to pay the Humane Society according to the following fee structure:

- 1. For the first ten (10) days of impoundment, the Municipality will pay the Humane Society \$35 for each 24-hour period of impoundment.
- 2. If the impounded dog is not claimed by the 10<sup>th</sup> day of impoundment, the Municipality will be charged an additional \$300.
- 3. The Humane Society reserves the sole right to make all decisions regarding the dog's disposition. Regular NYS shelter standards shall apply for adoption of dogs retained longer than the stipulated period.
- 4. All payments will be due upon receipt of an invoice, which will be mailed within the month following the month for which the invoice applies.

5. Any day on which the Humane Society is not open for any reason will be considered an excluded 24-hour period.

<u>EIGHTH</u>: The Humane Society is hereby prohibited from assigning, transferring, conveying, or subletting this Agreement, or otherwise disposing of the same; or its right, title, or interest therein; or its power to execute such Agreement to any other person, company, or corporation, without the prior approval of the Municipality.

NINTH: In the case of an injured dog, the Municipality shall be separately responsible for any emergency veterinary care required.

<u>TENTH</u>: No liability in damages or otherwise shall be incurred by the Humane Society or the Municipality on account of seizure, surrender, euthanasia, or adoption pursuant to the provisions of Article 7.

ELEVENTH: If anyone other than the DCO brings a stray dog to the Humane Society, the Humane Society will notify the DCO and/or the Municipal Clerk of the Municipality in which the dog was found by telephone, and unless otherwise instructed, will subsequently accept the dog. The DCO shall appear at the shelter within twenty-four hours to complete all necessary paperwork pursuant to NYS Agriculture and Markets Law Article 7, §113.

THIS AGREEMENT was duly authorized by the Board of the Columbia-Greene Humane Society, Inc., on November 1, 2016.

This letter is in response to your requests for speed limit reductions on Newry Lane King Hill Road in the Town of Greenville.

Currently, Newry Lane between Irving Road and County Route 38 is un posted and, therefore, regulated by the statewide 55 MPH speed limit. We conducted a speed limit investigation on Newry Lane and determined that a reduction of the speed limit is warranted. We have written a Notice of Order for a 40 mph speed limit, which is being filed with the Secretary of State. Upon receipt of this order, you may arrange to have the appropriate speed limit signs installed in accordance with the MUTCD and NYS Supplement.

King Hill Road was reviewed by this office in 2013 and, at that time, a 45 mph speed limit was established. Upon your most recent request, we reviewed this road. There were no significant changes or development along this road to warrant a further reduction of the posted speed limit.

As public officials, we have the great honor and responsibility to advocate for policies that strengthen our communities and expand opportunity for our hardworking constituents. I am grateful to have been able to serve alongside you on behalf of residents of the 19<sup>th</sup> District over the past two years.

Throughout the 115<sup>th</sup> Congress, my colleagues and I in the House of Representatives were able to cut through the noise and forge bipartisan solutions to improve and expand access to care for our veterans, modernize our nation's water and airport infrastructure, as well as support our farmers and local small businesses. We also passed comprehensive legislation to combat the opioid epidemic. Sylvia Hasenkopf-Greenville History

A classic mid-November day in the mid-40s, first sunny and then cloudy, less windier than the day before greeted the season's biggest turnout of our season: Carolyn Savery, Stephanie Ingalls, Bob D'Agostino, Lew Knott, Mary Heisinger, Kathy Smith, Terry & Garth Bryant, Arlene Brown, Bob Shaw, Audrey Matott, Debra Start, Flip Flach, Edna Huffman, Steve Johannesen, Virginia Cantarella, Susan Cunningham, Chuck Engelhardt, Al Hulick, John Garofalo & Peter O'Hara, Johanna & Robert Titus, Gail Nicholsen, Rachel Ceasar, Richard Ceasar, Donna & Walter Ingalls & Aidyn. Sarah Stevens, Norma & Craig Albano, John Earl, Sylvia Hasenkopf, Don Teator, and a half dozen others who avoided my steel trap mind and the sign-in list.

The Third Sylvia (third consecutive year finishing our season in November) attracted the turnout this evening. And what a program it was. I came close to deputizing all of you attending as Greenville Town Historian in Good Standing after hearing Sylvia's thorough narration of early Greenville.

Utilizing her research over the past three decades, Sylvia crafted a worthy explanation of how our 40 square miles became Greenville. Explaining post-1809 is easy; pre-1809, well, not so easy.

To prove her point, Sylvia noted that Reuben Rundle, one of our earliest settlers, lived in these places:

1786 - Coxsackie District, Albany Co

1788 - Town of Coxsackie, Albany Co

1790 - Town of Freehold, Albany Co

1800 - Town of Freehold, Greene Co


1803 - Town of Greenfield, Greene Co

1808 – Town of Freehold, Greene Co 1809 – Town of Greenville, Greene Co

And Never Moved!

Sylvia elicited a roomful of chuckles with that note, but she had prepared the crowd for this outcome. The eight-panel map (included), although not explicitly made for Greenville, does a nice job showing some of those changes.


As land was settled early, areas were named, renamed as population

grew, renamed as divisions were made, and renamed into final names

Sylvia particularly noted Freehold could refer to the current small hamlet in southern Town of Greenville, or to the Town of "Greenville" from 1808-1809, and to the early area—split off from Coxsackie—that covered area that includes today's Town of Durham and parts of Schoharie County.



Sylvia's talk also ventured into the first land owners. Of course, real early on there were no land "owners." But as the continent was "discovered," the countries claiming the land doled out parcels, or patents, as rewards, mostly in the 1700s. The included map shows the boundaries of some the land grants (patents) and the names associated: Scott, Van Bergen, Salisbury, Coeymans, Prevost, and Hallenbeck. Other names appear in historical records and are worth continued research, if you wish.

Another of Sylvia's topics was early settlers. The big picture seems to show the first settlers entered about 1750, on the east side of town, much later than the early settlers of the Hudson Valley towns. The hostilities of the American Revolution seems to have given these early settlers (Brandow,

Lampman, Bogardus and a few others) good reason to vacate the premises until peace could be restored. And with the end of the war in 1783, a trickle of human settlers increased to a stream. Historical markers memorialize Spees, Lake, and Knowles as some of the newest of the post-war settlers. Others include Losee, King, and Waldron, as identified by Sylvia.

Sylvia spent some time discussing one of the pre-war settlers, Godfrey Brandow, in particular. GB seems to have settled a farm on what is today King Hill Road, married an Overbaugh of the Embought District (Catskill area, today), and together bore the first white child born in the Town of Greenville.

Another major discussion involved Augustine
Prevost, one of the few patentees who lived on his land (the others being speculators). The importance of family connections and political pull was detailed as was the selling of parcels of his land, his good deeds,

his connection to Aaron Burr and Alexander Hamilton, and more that is worth your research if you are so inclined.

Sylvia finished with a listing of hamlets and their beginnings, the importance of early churches, and the significance of the Greenville Academy.

Thank you, Sylvia, for another worthy segment of local history that not only informed us of our history but also demonstrated your high level of research expertise and story-telling!

An interesting segment of the postmeeting was Curt Cunnigham's five minute presentation of the Spees material he has. Curt is a descendant of early settler Benjamin Spees and has collected a volume of material related to the family. Of note is his copy of the Spees diary.

A follow-up note, involving the floor debate about the map showing the Basic

Creek and the location of Greenville's center: at meeting's end, Sylvia approached me and, possibly because of a couple discussions with those attending, clarified her thoughts. First, her identification of the Basic Creek was correct. Second, the location of Greenville, as most of you realized, needed to be to the east of Basic Creek, and it was, as it still is. (ha). The roadway first confused with today's Rt 32 seems to coincide with today's Ingalside Rd and Red Mill Rd. A thank you to all for the thoughtful participation. (A copy of that patent map shows the squiggly line to be the Basic Creek.)

#### Notes:

- A thank you goes to Stephanie and Christine for producing the light refreshments promised in the newspapers and for doing so for the entire GLHG year.
- I had talked to Ron Golden earlier in the day, who wished to be remembered to all.
- The Civil War Round Table still operates during the winter months. Check in with Mary Heisinger for the schedule. If you need an email, contact me and I will relay her email.
- A memorial service was held for Nick Nahas (Town of Durham historian) on Thanksgiving Saturday. His passing is a loss for the family and community but one of my takeaways from the service was for us living to be like Nick. For those of you who knew Nick, you know what this means.

#### **Projects Note:**

Our 2018 program year draws to a close, to be continued in April 2019. The long stretch of winter in between allows for work on local history projects, yours and mine, to be initiated, continued, and/or shared during the coming year, and there are many ways to contribute. I would urge you to think of a topic to record and detail. These might include: family history, people in the community, community events, e.g., Fire Company history, hot air balloon fest history, weather events, bars in town, GCS musicals, a history of a street

based on your memory, a family genealogy, the service organizations, eateries of the town, the Greenville Pond, artists, lifestyle changes, events that shook the town, town politics, budgets of the school or town, and more. I hope this gives an idea. Feel free to make notes, write out into an article, or use audiotape & videotape. If you would like to share your idea with the group, contact me with your idea and I will share with our email group (180 strong). If you need help editing, I have a couple volunteers who have offered.

There were 1,345 households out of which 30.8% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 55.5% were married couples, 9.0% had a female householder with no husband present, and 31.7% were nonfamilies. 26.5% of all households were made up of individuals and 12.3% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.47 and the average family size was 3.01.

In the town, the population was spread out with 25.1% under the age of 18, 5.4% from 18 to 24, 26.3% from 25 to 44, 25.0% from 45 to 64, and 18.2% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 41 years. For every 100 females, there were 95.1 males. For every 100 females age 18 and over, there were 94.1 males.

The median income for a household in the town was \$38,423, and the median in-

come for a family was \$45,880. Males had a median income of \$35,217 versus \$25,216 for females. The per capita income for the town was \$19,113. About 6.2% of families and 8.7% of the population were below the poverty line, including 14.7% of those under age 18 and 6.3% of those age 65 or over.


It is with pleasure and pride that I conclude my thirtieth year as Town Historian. This coming June will be the thirtieth anniversary of the first GLHG meeting.
