The regular monthly meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Greenville was held on Monday, November 18, 2019, at 7:00 pm at Pioneer Hall.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Presenters from the Northeast USA Vietnam Veterans Reunion Association Monument Committee Timothy Broder, Robert Whitbeck, and Jim Sill offered their gratitude to the Town Board and the Town of Greenville for their tremendous support of Veterans in our community. Mr. Broder made an official public announcement of their plan to build a monument and erect a flagpole; this will be located in Veterans Memorial Park. They also presented a plaque in appreciation of the Town Board's support over the past 20 years.

Mr. Bensen moved to accept the Clerk's minutes of October 21, 2019 and November 6, 2019, seconded by Mr. Bear. Carried 5 ayes

Oral and/or written reports were received from the following departments: Greenville Rescue Squad ~ Chief Matthew Marlow provided an oral and written report; the proposed 2020 – 2022 contract has been provided and reviewed.

Mr. Richards moved, seconded by Mr. Rauf, to accept this 3 year Greenville Rescue Squad, Inc., contract.

Carried 5 ayes

Highway Department ~ Superintendent Williams provided an oral report. Supervisor Macko noted there was a used Everest snowplow in the Town of Broome from Auctions International. Listed at \$720, Mr. Macko feels this is a bargain.

Mr. Rauf moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, moved to authorize Supervisor Macko to expend up to \$2,000 to purchase this item at auction.

Carried 5 aves

Building and Grounds ~ Oral report received from Maintenance Supervisor Hamilton. Supervisor Macko and Councilman Richards noted a great turnout of about 30 people at the Skateboard Park/Prevost Hall cleanup day last week. Thanks offered to all involved.

Code Enforcement ~ Oral and written reports received from CEO Mark Overbaugh.

Sewer ~ Supervisor Macko reported the sewer plant has met all expected parameters.

Water ~ Water Superintendent Bear offered an oral report. Discussed the upcoming capital project; stated he would like to discuss using stainless steel valves versus cast on the risers. Although more expensive, their longevity is far greater. Acknowledged by the board without motions made.

Recycling ~ Councilman Bear reported all is well there.

Assessing ~ Assessor Bennett's written report read by Supervisor Macko.

Planning Board ~ Chair Donald Teator provided a written report as well as verbally updated the Board on three cases brought before them last month.

Dog Control ~ no report received. Supervisor Macko noted the annual NYS Agriculture and Markets' inspection s have been done. The shelter inspection was deemed 'satisfactory' and the DCO evaluation showed only one issue relating to equipment not being available to properly capture dogs. Supervisor Macko will personally follow up to make sure all is in order.

Beautification Committee ~ Mrs. Barbara Walter thanked the Town for all the work completed on Prevost Hall. The Committee has also been working on obtaining a grant for an ADA accessible bathroom and kitchenette at that Hall, with plans of using it as a public space. The duck project is ongoing; when asked if the Town Board would like to sponsor a duck it was decided each Councilman would contribute \$100 to sponsor the \$500 duck.

Clerk/Tax ~ written reports provided.

Greene County Legislator Greg Davis ~ written report received and read by Supervisor Macko.

New business discussed at 7:32 pm:

~the Old Timer's Christmas party will be held on Sunday, December 1st at 12:00 noon at the GCS high school auditorium and café. Volunteers' help gratefully accepted on Saturday morning and/or Sunday!

~the 2020 Columbia Greene Humane Society contract is up for annual renewal. It is unalterable as well as unchanged from the previous contract.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, to authorize Supervisor Macko to sign this 2020 contract with the Columbia Greene Humane Society.

Carried 5 ayes

~NYMIR (General liability insurance carrier) has conducted an inspection and they recommend the following areas be addressed: highway and salt shed issues, and the North Barn. A usage form was recommended be developed for those renting the North Barn. Maintenance Supervisor Hamilton asked if a \$50 refundable deposit could be included, refundable with return of the keys. Regarding the highway and salt shed recommendations, they would like battery disconnect switches on the highway trucks. Supervisor Macko requested the Board read and review their recommendations; for follow up next month.

~There will be a New Town Official class held in Albany on January 15-17, 2020 and any new Officials or interested other Officials are encouraged to attend.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting for public comments and questions at 7:40 pm:

~Ms. Anita Zibura inquired if anything has been done for those not hooked up to the sewer extension. Discussion ensued. Code Enforcement Overbaugh noted there were 8 – 10 people with open permits, and many more who did not reply to the letters sent out and were not connected. All agreed options for follow up action needed to be discussed with Attorney Rappleyea (not present this evening).

~Mr. James Stryker, currently with a project before the Planning Board, requested the Town allow access onto his parcel via Town Park Road, as he said the NYSDOT advised this. Discussion followed;

although named "Road" it actually is a driveway access to the Town Park. It is not built to highway specifications, is not a legal Road, and does not have a cul-de-sac. Councilman Richards questioned the legality of allowing access. Councilman Rauf thinks it would be difficult for the Town of Greenville to grant access for a commercial property via Town property. Mr. Stryker thanked the Board for their time and consideration.

There being no other business, Mr. Bear moved to enter executive session at 7:51 pm, seconded by Mr. Rauf, to discuss the medical, financial, credit or employment history of a particular person/corp, or matters leading to said dismissal, removal, promotion, appointment, employment, discipline, demotion, or suspension. Highway Superintendent Williams and Assessor Bennett were invited to participate.

Carried 5 ayes

Mr. Rauf moved to return to regular session at 8:31 pm, seconded by Mr. Richards. Carried 5 ayes

No motions were made in executive session.

December 4, 2019

An emergency meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Greenville was held on Wednesday, December 4, 2019, at 5:03 pm at Pioneer Hall. This meeting was called by Supervisor Macko on Wednesday morning and notice was immediately given to the Pioneer and Catskill Daily Mail newspapers and WRIP radio, was sent to the Town of Greenville's website for posting, and was noticed on the signboard in front of Town Hall. The Pioneer Newspaper also posted the information on their Facebook page.

Department Heads: Zoning and Code Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh

Other: 8 guests

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. He then explained this meeting had been called to address the recent snowfall and the broken equipment at the Highway Garage; they are down 1 ½ plows, and "have a mess on their hands". He had received 50+ calls with complaints of the road condition and expressed great disappointment with some of the quality of the work that was done by the guys, and the lack of urgency to repair what is broken. Stated he believes that with the amount of taxes we all pay, there is no excuse for the poor condition of roads or equipment. Noted he doesn't usually call for an emergency meeting, but this was a matter of public safety and it couldn't wait.

Lengthy discussion followed regarding specifically what was in good working condition and what was not. Councilman Richards thought our Maintenance Department could help to open up some of the roads within Country Estates. Calls have been made to outside mechanics to assist in the repairs, and thus far all are unavailable. Some names were suggested as options; Councilman Rauf made a call during this meeting to Ralph Borwegen of Borwegen Trucking and Repair, who agreed to do the heavy truck repair. Councilman Rauf also offered for discussion, if not unethical, to use his company's mobile service technician for the other, in-shop, repairs. He could free up his workload and allow him to work at the shop here to make the necessary repairs that have not been done by our own highway department employees. He will abstain from signing the payment voucher and offer him up at a favorable rate. Supervisor Macko reported the plow that was purchased from the Town of Broome via auction was being picked up this week thanks to Councilman Bensen. Also noted there was unexpended money in the Highway line which he feels should be used to purchase a good, 4 wheel drive pickup with a plow.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to allow Councilman Rauf's service man repair the Peterbilt brake situation and plow, at the Highway Garage. Councilman Bear stated he had contacted the Teamsters to notify them of the emergency situation and that they were aware 'outside' people were coming in.

Carried 4 ayes; Councilman Rauf abstained

Mr. Bear moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, to send the OshKosh to Borwegen's Trucking and Repair shop to install the transfer case.

Carried 5 ayes

Discussion occurred regarding buying new versus used pickups. It was asked why the trucks were breaking down, and if something was lacking in general maintenance? Councilman Bensen replied affirmatively, and added they were also old. Clerk-Collector Park asked if compiling an inventory and

condition of all Town vehicles and equipment could be documented, and a long-term plan for replacement be devised in order to avoid this situation in the future.

Discussion of the condition of Main Street occurred. Supervisor Macko has repeatedly asked the NYSDOT Supervisor in Cairo, Steve Shepherd, to clean up the part of State Route 81 we know as Main Street; annually he is denied. He will call again in the morning, and if no cooperation can be obtained, he will pursue other avenues. Councilman Rauf added that we now have "draws" on Main Street, and as a community we need to support these businesses!

A few other local residents reported displeasure with the state of the roads and lack of attention to the snowed-in hydrants in Country Estates. Another complaint was directed at the Highway Superintendent specifically. It was noted the Town Council had no authority over an Elected Official. Councilman Bear stated, "We, as a Town Board, are working together to do the best we can for the Town of Greenville." Supervisor Macko implied that all would improve "in 27 days". Councilman Bensen noted, "Hopefully we'll fix these emergency issues. The new man coming in has a daunting task ahead."

There being no further business, Mr. Macko moved to adjourn at 5:57 pm.

Meeting opened by Don Teator at 6:03 pm with the Pledge of Allegiance

Jim Stryker - Special Use Permit - Possible Laundromat - 12.04-4-29

Don reviewed the proposal for the possible laundromat in front of the Town Park. He stated that Mr. Stryker needed to address the required items for a Site Plan Review, Special Use Permit as well as a Preservation Review.

Don read a letter from Planning Board member Will Bardel stating that since him and Debra Danner are also members of the Community Partners that they would recuse themselves from the Community Partners on any matters associated with the laundromat proposal. Tal and the rest of the Board found this acceptable.

Don addressed Mr. Stryker and Mr. Wilcox and stated that they did not address the points of the Special Use Permit or the Preservation Law. It was recommended that the find someone to help them with this before they return. Tal also stated that Town Park Road is not considered a town road so access to the property would need to be off of State Route 32.

Tal again stated that an escrow account-would need to be established so that the Town's engineer could review any plans:

Don addressed the audience and stated that any input that they would like to have would be best in letter or email form at this point.

Todd Woodard Possible Altered Lot Line 51.00-3-30.12 & 51.00-3-30.2

Mr. Woodard was present tonight to ask the Board if he would be able to alter the lot line of his 2 properties on Sunny Hill Road. One of the parcels is land locked so the change would allow access to the parcel and also include a barn which is currently on the accessable parcel. The Board felt there would be no problem with the lot line change as long as there is 150 feet of road frontage on each parcel when new lots are created. Mr. Woodard stated that he is waiting for a surveyor and then he will proceed. Don stated that if maps are in order the Board could approve the Lot Line change at the next meeting Mr. Woodard attends as there is no public hearing required.

Angel Wang - Special Use Permit - Event Venue - 11.00-4-14

Ms. Wang was present tonight to address the Board about making her newly purchased residence at 169 Maple Ave. into an event venue. She would like to put a pavilion or tent up on the property behind the house near the stream. Depending on cost of a pavilion Ms. Wang may need to start with a tent, and then add the pavilion at a later date. The Board stated that they would look at project as a whole. Ms. Wang would make the parking area alongside and down behind the barn on the opposite side of the road. The Board reviewed what would need to be addressed to move forward. Those points were: Parking, time of events/types, maximum size, noise, lighting, well/septic. It was also stated that Ms.

Wang should check with DEC about placement of the pavilion near the creek due to possible wetlands. Ms. Wang stated that she will address the concerns for the next meeting.

Minutes

Motion made to approve the minutes from October 2, 2019 was made by Ken Elsbree. Seconded by Bud Bear. All in favor: 5, Opposed: 0, motion carried.

Discussion

Don asked if there were any questions from the audience: Questions were raised about the new LED signs going in at the school. As the Planning Board had nothing to do with the approval of the signs, the audience members were advised to address any concerns to the Code Enforcement Officer and the School Board. It was suggested that the Town Board may need to revisit the zoning law for signs due to possible light pollution from the LED signs.

It was also asked to post the Agenda for the upcoming meetings on line.

Motion made to close the meeting at 7:09 pm made by Debra Danner. Seconded by Ken Elsbree. All in favor: 5, Opposed: 0, motion carried.

Planning Board report – December 2019

December 4:

The agenda included:

An altered lot line for property on Willowbrook Rd was proposed. After lead agency, SEQRA, and waiver of public hearing, the altered lot line was approved.

A subdivision of a 15 acre lot on Old Plank Rd was proposed. Complicating this project was looking for language about required road frontage. In a past town law, a 50 driveway accessing back property was sufficient, and the drawing reflected that. However, that is no longer in our town law and the applicant's representative needed to adjust for a 150 foot road frontage, the requirement for LD zone. Acceptance of that plan by the owner needs to be determined and will probably come back next month.

The third, and last, item on the agenda was a continuation of the proposed event venue on Maple Avenue. Several issues were identified as needing further development, with DOH playing a key role. This item will probably return next month.

The agenda did not include:

An update on the Laundromat. A discussion between Mr. Wilcox and Town Attorney earlier in the day pointed out the usefulness of the co-owners utilizing an engineer/planner. To be continued.

Paul,

The road to the tank coming from the end of the Meadow Brook Lane would mostly be through areas which would be considered wetland by the Army Corps of Engineers (Corp Wetlands). Since we would be eliminating over 1/10-acre of such wetlands DEC is insisting that we "mitigate" this impact. Due to the type of wetlands, they are asking us to build 2-4 times the area that we eliminate. Once the replacement wetland is designed and constructed, they will require it be monitored for 5 years to make sure plants grow etc. and it turns into a "wetland." This mitigation area would be on the south end of the property.

By the time this is designed, constructed and monitored we are estimating the costs will be upwards of \$100,000. As a way to avoid this cost, Ed Fahrenkopf of our office checked further with the Corps and found that they would accept a deed restriction in lieu of "mitigation." The map shows the area where the deed restriction would be imposed which includes the entire wetland area as well as the southern half of the property. Much off this southern section would have been taken up by the "mitigation" wetland.

What this would do is allow for a 18-ft road into the north end of the property where the tank would be built and where you have discussed putting a well. The area northwest of the wetland would be available for other uses.




Sylvia Hasenkopf, for the fourth consecutive November, closed out our GLHG season with another worthy program. This program's idea was formulated last November, based on some research Sylvia was developing at the time. And the GLHG was the beneficiary this month of a topic that is somewhat known in its general outline but is familiar to only to a few for the details. This was an opportune time to revive East Greenville, the Rundle-Butler feud, Brandy Hill, and the Butler tinware operation(s).

Sylvia's presentation, this evening, centered on two enterprising families who prospered in East Greenville. East Greenville refers to the cluster of buildings that currently or formerly populated the length of County Route 26 between Highland Rd and Scutt Rd, with the intersection of Newry Rd and Pine Lake Manor the epicenter of the district. Two maps from Sylvia's Power Point are included.

Note: the description below comes from Sylvia's presentation; without her notes, my review would be a bit hit-and-miss. Much appreciated, Sylvia. In addition to all her research, she also referenced Ray Beecher's chapter on East Greenville in Out to Greenville.

The first settlers from these two families, as were many others who settled Greenville, came from Connecticut. Abel Butler and wife Elizabeth Johnson came to Greenville in 1799. He had fought in the American Revolution, raised a successful family and died in 1823. Reuben Rundle first arrived to "Greenville" in 1786 before settling in East Greenville a few years later. Sylvia had us imagining what early life in this area, and any other newly settled area, must have been like.

One of their major business was fruit growing and the resulting distilleries. Later records from the 1800s show thousands of barrels of fruit grown and a large production of hard apple cider and brandy, a fact that still is reflected in Brandy Hill appellation of this area.

The Rundles, in addition to the distillery business, also operated a hotel in East Greenville.

The Butlers became involved in the tinsmithing business, a fact confirmed in Sylvia's findings in the NYS 1820 Manufacturing census. Sylvia gave a short ten minute explanation of the importance of tinware in early NYS history and how the Butlers were a significant player in this business, one of two in Greene County in this census. Tinware, and the Butler tinware, could easily be a program by itself, and Tom Baumann, whose house sits on the site of one of these program families, brought several pieces of tinware to show. Thank you, Tom.

Side note: Both families were instrumental in the construction of the early Episcopal Church in East Greenville, with expenses given in some detail by Sylvia. When it closed in favor of the construction of the current Episcopal Church in Greenville, it has long been reported that the structure was moved, or rebuilt, by the Vanderbilt family. This "new" building in town became locally known as the Vanderbilt Theater, the cultural center of Greenville for many years. Later,

this building served as a movie house, then the NAPA building, and then finally as the pink hulk torn down in the 1980s to make way for Cumberland Farm.


Back to business.

All of this family history is a success story whose details cannot be fully captured in this newsletter. Perhaps, Sylvia will document this in one of her columns, if not done already.

However, all this success is somewhat tainted by the reason I lured many of you to the meeting—the feud between these two families. And Sylvia pointed out that the basis of this feud may have been the proximity of these successful ventures as well as plain old human nature. As the saying goes, it takes only one bad apple to ruin the barrel. Given their business model, this could be taken literally as well as figuratively.

In retrospect, any of these disagreements could have been handled more suitably. But I guess the same can be said for any argument, even today.

So, one of the bad apples was a multistanza song sung by the workmen in the

building of a Butler house. The song contained some derogatory things about the Rundles, particularly about a mentally challenged son and a coffin that seemed to have been bought ahead of a death. 'Twasn't pretty. A lawsuit started in the mid-1820s and Sylvia speculated did not end until the deaths of the two patriarchs some thirty years later, with a lawsuit apparently being part of every year.

Another bad apple was the new Butler house that happened to be built a few feet on the road right-away. Rundle (Rundell is the other common spelling, of course), who was contracted to fix the road, felt it was his duty to move some of the building supplies off the road. You can guess how that went.

Again, you are getting only the very short version, leaving Sylvia to detail in her columns.

Sylvia, thank you for your notes so I could make sense of what my brain was told this evening!

After the meeting, Sylvia emailed me with information she found. Abigail Rundle is actually Lewis Butler's wife, and Arron Butler's daughter-in-law. And I thought the marriage of two families was supposed to make friends.

And there was some question about which house was whose. I did not keep them straight but I think Sylvia yielded that Don Berkhofer was right about the Haight house being a Butler house. Or was it a Rundle house?

Sylvia, thank you for once again providing the Greenville community another excellent insight into our history. Your skills are among the best in the area!
