Over the past few weeks I have had conversations with several land owners who have been contacted by solar companies regarding installation of solar "farms" on their properties. The companies are usually looking for a lease period of 20 years on a 20 acre portion of their property with a per acre lease fee of 1000 to 1500 per acre per year. This is a significant income stream for a taxpayer to be eligible for. It has come to my attention that the zoning has no provisions for this type of use and is denied because of that. I would suggest that, in order to allow this kind of opportunity for some Greenville taxpayers, that some allowances or procedures put into place.

TOWN OF GREENVILLE LOCAL LAW # OF 2016 AMENDING ZONING LAW TO CREATE REGULATION AND APPROVAL STANDARDS FOR SOLAR COLLECTION SYSTEMS

§			
Small-scale	solar	collector	system.

A. Purpose and intent.

- (1) The purpose of these regulations is to balance the potential impact on neighbors where solar collectors may be installed near their property while preserving the rights of property owners to install solar collection systems without excess regulation. These regulations are not intended to override the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law.
- (2) Solar energy is a renewable and nonpolluting energy resource that can prevent fossil fuel emissions and reduce energy load. Energy generated from solar energy systems can be used to offset energy demand on the grid when excess solar power is generated.

B. Applicability.

- (1) The requirements herein shall apply to all solar collector system installations modified or installed after the effective date of this section.
- (2) Solar collector system installations for which a valid building permit has been properly issued, or for which installation has commenced before the effective date of this section, shall not be required to meet the requirements of this section, except in accordance with Subsection D, Safety, found herein this section. Any modification, expansion or alteration to an existing solar collector system shall only be permitted in accordance with § 219-39.2 herein.
- (3) All solar collector systems shall be designed, erected and installed in accordance with all applicable codes, regulations and industry standards as referenced in the New York State Building Code.

C. Permitting.

- (1) Rooftop and flush-mounted solar collectors are permitted in all zoning districts in the Town of Greenville subject to the following conditions:
 - (a) Building permits shall be required for installation of all rooftop and flushmounted solar collectors.
 - (b) Height limitations for structures found in Article IV, Use, Area and Bulk Regulations, shall apply.
 - (c) Rooftop and flush-mounted solar collector systems are permitted on the following structures:
 - [1] All principal structures.

- [2] All accessory structures that meet the principal structure setbacks as required in each zoning district.
- (d) Rooftop units must be three feet from any chimney and shall not be permitted on any roof overhangs.
- (e) Any solar collector system attached to a pitched roof shall not extend more than three feet from the surface of the angle of the roof.
- (2) Ground-mounted racks and freestanding solar collectors are permitted as an accessory structure in all zoning districts in the Town of Greenville subject to the following conditions:
 - (a) Building permits shall be required for installation of all ground-mounted and freestanding solar collectors.
 - (b) A special use permit is required for all ground-mounted racks and freestanding solar collectors in a commercial zoning district, which for purposes of this Zoning chapter shall include the ______ zones.
 - (c) Special use permit from the Planning Board is required for all ground-mounted racks and freestanding solar collectors greater than 10 feet in height or greater than 20 feet in length or if the solar array surface area is greater than 200 square feet in the aggregate in all residential zoning districts. All other ground-mounted racks and freestanding solar collectors shall follow the standard building permit process.
 - (d) All ground-mounted racks and freestanding solar collectors shall have a maximum height of 20 feet from ground elevation.
 - (e) All ground-mounted racks and freestanding solar collectors installed in the side or rear yards shall comply with the setback requirements for a principal structure found in Article III.C. Schedule B, Town of Greenville Dimensional Standards.
 - (f) Solar collectors may be installed in any front yard but shall not be less than 75 feet from the front property line and shall require a special use permit.
 - (g) Solar collectors shall be located in a manner that reasonably minimizes shading of adjacent property while still providing adequate solar access for collectors.

D. Safety.

- (1) All solar energy systems and solar collectors must obtain a building permit and shall be designed to be and installed to be in conformance with the New York Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code Standards that are applicable when the building permit is issued.
- (2) If solar storage batteries are included, they must be placed in a secure container or enclosure meeting the requirements of the New York State Building Code when in use. When they are no longer in use, they shall be disposed of in accordance with the laws of New York State Fire Prevention and Building Code and local laws of the Town of Greenville and any other applicable laws or regulations.
- (3) Glare and heat. No unreasonable glare or heat shall be produced that is perceptible beyond the boundaries of the lot on which such use is situated.

§			
Utility-	scale sola	r collecto	r system.

A. Purpose and intent.

- (1) The purpose of these regulations is to provide utility-scale solar collector systems through performance criteria that balance the unique characteristics of each site. Utility-scale solar collector systems are only allowed in the _____ zones.
- (2) In any instances where specific permitted uses, area, or height standards, development guidelines and/or review procedures specifically set forth in this section conflict with any other general provision or requirements of the Zoning chapter, the particular provisions set forth herein shall take precedence and control.
- B. Bulk and area requirements. The following dimensional requirements shall apply to all utility-scale solar collector systems:
 - (1) Height.
 - (a) All solar collectors shall have a maximum height of 20 feet from ground elevation.
 - (b) All buildings and accessory structures associated with the utility-scale solar collector system shall have a maximum height of 35 feet, excluding the solar collector.
- (2) Setback. All utility-scale solar collector systems and associated buildings, accessory structures and equipment shall have a minimum setback from any property line of 200 feet.
 - (3) Lot coverage.
 - (a) Impervious surface lot coverage. All utility-scale solar collector systems and associated accessory structures and equipment shall utilize a maximum of 20% impervious lot coverage.
 - (b) Pervious surface lot coverage. All utility-scale solar collector systems and associated accessory structures and equipment shall utilize a minimum of 80% permeable lot coverage.

C. General provisions.

- (1) Site plan. All utility-scale solar collector systems shall provide a site plan in accordance with Article IX of this Zoning Law.
- (2) Signage. All signage shall be provided as part of site plan review and shall be in accordance with Article V. I. of this Zoning Law.
 - (3) Visual.
 - (a) Utility-scale solar collector systems shall be sited in a manner to have the least possible practical visual effect on the environment.
 - (b) A visual environmental assessment form (Visual EAF), landscaping plan and visual assessment report, including appropriate modeling and photography assessing the visibility from key viewpoints identified in the Visual EAF, existing tree lines, surrounding topography, and proposed elevations shall be required.

- (c) Landscaping, screening and/or earth berming shall be provided to minimize the potential visual impacts associated with the utility-scale solar collector systems and its accessory buildings, structures and/or equipment. Additional landscaping, screening and/or earth berming may be required by the Town Board and/or the Planning Board to mitigate visual and aesthetic impacts.
- (d) Any associated structure shall be screened, placed underground, depressed, earth bermed or sited below the ridgeline to the greatest extent feasible, particularly in areas of high visibility.
- (4) Lighting. A lighting plan shall be required. No utility-scale solar collector system shall be artificially lighted unless otherwise required by a federal, state or local authority. Exterior lighting may be provided for associated accessory structures and access entrances as may be determined appropriate for security purposes only.
- (5) Utilities. The applicant shall provide written confirmation that the electric grid has the capacity to support the energy generated from the utility-solar collector system. Electrical and land-based telephone utilities extended to serve the site shall be underground.
- (6) Access. The applicant shall indicate on a site plan all existing and proposed access to the site, including road, electric power, emergency access, land-based telephone line connection, and other utilities existing and proposed within the property boundaries of the proposed location. Existing roadways shall be used for access to the site whenever possible and determined acceptable by the Planning Board through site plan review.
- (7) Glare and heat. No unreasonable glare or heat shall be produced that is perceptible beyond the boundaries of the lot on which such use is situated.
- (8) Ownership. In the case of an application for a utility-scale solar collector system to be located on private lands owned by a party other than the applicant or the Town, a copy of the lease agreement with the property owner shall be filed with the Building Department.
- (9) Proof of insurance. The applicant and the owner of the property where the utility-scale solar collector system is to be located shall file with the Building Department proof of insurance in a sufficient dollar amount to cover potential personal and property damage associated with construction and operation thereof.
- (10) Security provisions. Each site shall have a minimum of an eight-foot security fence to prevent unauthorized access and vandalism to the utility-scale solar collectors and a security program for the site as approved by the Planning Board during site plan review.
- (11) Noise. Noise-producing equipment shall be sited and/or insulated to minimize noise impacts on adjacent properties as approved by the Planning Board during site plan review.
- (12) Documentation from the utility company, verifying that the utility-scale solar collector system is active, shall be provided annually to the Town of Greenville Building Department.
- (13) Required sureties for construction, maintenance and removal of utility-scaled solar collector systems.
 - (a) Construction and maintenance. Prior to the issuance of a building permit for the utility-scale solar collector system and any associated accessory structures, the applicant shall post a surety in an amount and form acceptable to the Town for the purposes of construction and maintenance. The amount shall be up to 20% of the

construction value. Acceptable forms shall include, in order of preference: cash; letter of credit; or a bond that cannot expire; or a combination thereof. Such surety will be used to guarantee compliance with the conditions of the approval for the utility-scale solar collector. If the owner of the site fails to comply with any conditions of the approval during construction or as part of the long-term maintenance of the site, all costs of the Town incurred to comply with conditions of the approval shall be paid using the surety provided by the applicant. Failure to comply with the conditions of the approval or to maintain an acceptable level of surety will result in revocation of the certificate of occupancy.

(b) Removal. The utility-scale solar collector system, including any accessory structures and/or equipment, shall be dismantled and removed from the site when the utility-scale solar collector system has been inoperative or abandoned for two years. As a condition of the certificate of compliance, applicants shall post a surety in an amount and form acceptable to the Town for the purposes of removal or abandonment. The amount shall be up to 20% of the construction cost. Acceptable forms shall include, in order of preference: cash; letter of credit; or a bond that cannot expire; or a combination thereof. Such surety will be used to guarantee removal of the utility-scale solar collector system should the system be abandoned. Abandonment shall be assumed by the Town if the annual documentation as required in C. (12) above, is not provided by the owner, applicant or lessee for two consecutive years to the Town of Greenville Building Department. The Town Building Inspector shall then provide written notice to the owner to remove the utility-scale solar collector system, and the owner shall have two years from written notice to remove the utility-scale solar collector system, including any associated accessory structures and/or equipment, and restore the site to a condition approved by the Planning Board. If the owner, applicant or lessee fails to remove any associated structures or restore the site to the condition approved by the Planning Board, all costs of the Town incurred to comply with this condition shall be paid using the surety provided by the applicant.

Hi Paul - hope all is well. As you may recall a few months ago we spoke about EPA conducting a free assessment of your landfill to determine if it was a viable candidate for a solar project.

I may be in the Greenville area this week and am asking for the exact address of the landfill. I can do a short recon to get a sense of the physical layout of the site and then discuss a follow up visit with my coworkers.

So can you please provide the exact address of the site with any cross streets or landmarks to assist in locating the site. I sometimes find that even with an address the sites may be difficult to find.

Also as I previously mentioned EPA has two other programs to assist municipalities. Both are free services:
-thru our brownfields program we can conduct environmental assessments of sites that could be repurpose (for example a gas station). This will provide the municipality with information to determine if there is contamination at the site and the levels.

-thru our emergency response program we can conduct assessments at sites to determine if there are substantial threats to human health or the environment. If a site meets certain criteria, we can then conduct an action to address the contamination.

What to include in your letter of interest

Your letter of interest can be in the text of an email or an attachment. It should be no longer than two printed pages. If you want, you can provide additional letters of support from partners, but this is not necessary.

Community representatives are encouraged to describe community needs and challenges related to downtown revitalization or other place-based development, and how a planning process might help. You should indicate any areas of interest related to internet service and place-based development, such as:

- Using new or existing broadband service to attract new types of businesses to main streets or existing rural communities
- Combining internet service with other local amenities to attract new investors, visitors, and residents
- Developing or marketing downtown Wi-Fi zones
- Extending broadband service beyond anchor institutions in ways that promote main street development
- Selecting centrally located anchor institutions or community facilities that will receive broadband service

My annual report for 2015 reflects my efforts to further not only my own projects and but also discussions with the public about local history.

A collaboration with the Greenville Local History Group is a vital tool. With the help of the Group's 100+ members, the historian's files have accumulated information that helps preserve our knowledge of Greenville. Monthly meetings, April through November, not only continue to highlight various aspects of our local history but also serve to spread the accomplishments of the various members and continue to encourage "local historians" to continue preserving vital information. This year's topics included:

- "President and Mrs. Lincoln" relating April 1865 to us 150 years later
- slide show history and houses of O'Hara's Corners with brothers John and Peter O'Hara on hand
- memories of Main Street, Greenville, as related by dozens of residents
- Main Street, Greenville slide show of 160 photographs of different eras
- a portrayal of the Stevens families, as narrated by Sylvia Hasenkopf
- presentation by Beautification Committee for the preservation of the Presbyterian Church
- unveiling of the 2016 calendar (a copy to Supervisor)
- a travelogue of a trip to Italy

Additional topics included: publicizing the Ducks of Greenville, the finding of a barn timber in the Griffin barn signed by Truman Ingalls, drawing attention to the aspects of the Zoning Revision that related to local history interests, and the GLHG's recognition of Mary Heisinger.

I have continued to write a newsletter for the Greenville Local History Group (2015 issues: 241-248), a copy of which is given to you on a regular basis, as are any special publications relating to local history. Mailings are sent to about thirty members, and another one hundred ten technologically connected friends of local history receive this by email. These monthly meetings are also available on my website (http://www.dteator.com/glhg/glhg.htm), as are a few other local history topics.

Another major project, usually needing 50-75 hours, is the production of the Greenville Local History Group Calendar. 2016's edition captured a dozen views of old and new Greenville, highlighting the similarities and difference of then and now. In addition, the calendar recognizes the contributions that community members have made to the Greenville area.

The 2017 version is in the early stages of production.

2015 saw a continuation of past projects that continue to further the addition to and the sharing of information of the history of Town of Greenville.

The multi-part photo project—duplicating historic photos, recording local history with current photos, and re-using those we already have for new uses—continues. Sixty albums, both of photos and documents, record town history. These are the basis for the photographic presentations given to town and community groups.

In 2015, this photo archive gained several hundred scans of Greenville scenes and of a variety of Greenville families. In addition, the Xeroxing of documents and scrapbooks will allow seldom seen artifacts to be available to the public.

One project that is quietly working behind the scenes, with the help of two volunteers, is a Greenville Family Tree, using obituaries and newspaper records to enter names into a genealogy database.

Various other projects and duties cover the spectrum of a Historian's duties. In 2015, they included:

- attend to Town Board requests
- respond to about 10 letters
- answer about twenty phone calls

On Leaston

- reply to over seventy emails asking for genealogical and local history information
- continue the collection of business cards of people living in and associated with Greenville
- cross-referencing articles of local historical importance
- collaborated with Mary Lou Nahas at the Greene County Historical Society for a Boarding House program
- conducted a Greenville Cemetery tour for the Greenville Girl Scouts
- gave a local history program for the Greenville-Norton Hill Methodist Women

In closing, I feel 2015 was a productive local history year, made possible with the help of many people. I wish to thank the Greenville Town Board for their active support, as well as interest shown, for my activities. Your continued financial support allows for additions to the records that otherwise might not be possible. In addition, I thank my wife Debra for sharing my local history endeavors, the members of the Greenville Local History Group who have helped me be a better historian, and those individuals belonging to none of the above groups who, through action and encouragement, have proven that Greenville respects its local history.
